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Roots of Prevention Art & Award Celebration

Maia Vota received the Outstanding Individual Award!

Maia is a BHS student film maker who uses her films to bring attention to issues she cares about. Her work has covered all sorts of things, including the Social Justice Union's work last year to bring the Black Lives Matter flag to BHS. She is nominated for this award for a 4:24 short called "A Realistic Look at Distracted Driving" (link above). This film brings awareness to distracted driving in a very real and vulnerable way.

Maia's video actively and positively tries to impact the Burlington community by providing awareness as a strategy for prevention and support to the health and wellness of peers.

Gayle Botelho received the D.G. Weaver Award!

Gayle has been a physical education and health teacher at BHS for the past 16 years. For the past two, she has also taken on the Personal Learning Plan initiative for the entire district. This work has her working with students to develop other short and long term goals. She oversees the Independent Study PE students and works with the Horizons alternative program to help meet students' individual needs. She worked to help create a health class for ELL students to last a full year instead of the standard semester to better meet the needs of students learning English. She serves on the Building Wellness committee and is working to help make BSD a healthier place.



Gayle used grant funds to purchase and install water bottle filtration stations throughout the high school and created walking path maps for teachers and staff to increase their physical activity. Gayle is invested in promoting and increasing awareness about sexuality and relationships, and partners with Planned Parenthood to train student peer educators and offer monthly discussion opportunities for students in the district.

BHS Senior Jackson Elder Named 2019 Presidential Scholar!





Elder is one of 161 outstanding American high school seniors who have demonstrated outstanding academic achievement, artistic excellence, technical expertise, leadership, citizenship, service, and contribution to school and community. The U.S. Presidential Scholars will be honored for their accomplishments in Washington D.C., from June 23-25.

The White House Commission on Presidential Scholars selects honored scholars annually based on their academic success, artistic and technical excellence, essays, school evaluations and transcripts, as well as evidence of community service, leadership, and demonstrated commitment to high ideals. Of the 3.6 million students expected to graduate from high school this year, more than 5,200 candidates qualified for the 2019 awards.

Project Sticker Shock

Saturday June 1st from 12;30-4:00 at the Miler Community Center 130 Gosse Ct. Burlington Vermont

For the last 9 years the Burlington Partnership for a Healthy Community has been working with local tweens and teens to implement Project Sticker Shock around prom and graduation season to raise awareness of the consequences of underage drinking for teens and to those who provide alcohol to minors.

The afternoon begins with a pizza lunch and a short training about the activity. Then teams of adults and youth will be assigned local alcohol retailers to visit and sticker the alcohol and cooler windows with messages reminding people not to provide alcohol to minors.

- An estimated 88,0008 people die from alcohol-related causes annually, making alcohol the third leading preventable cause of death in the United States (the 1st is tobacco).
- 45% of teens in Burlington who reported drinking in the last month said that they got the alcohol by someone giving it to them and 22% reported they specifically gave someone money to buy it for them. (2017Burlington Youth Risk Behavior Survey)
- Teens who begin drinking in adolescence are at greater risk of developing alcohol dependence. "Of those individuals who began drinking before age 14, 47% experienced dependence at some point, vs. 9% of those who began drinking at age 21 or older."
- More teens die from drinking and driving during prom and graduation season (April June) than at any other time of year (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration data).
