

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Significant Impacts 2020 - Present

In August 2020 the Class of 2024 was welcomed to the campus of Burlington High School for orientation. At the end of their first day of school it was announced that there was extensive PCB contamination in the air throughout the shared campus of Burlington High School and Burlington Technical Center, forcing the Burlington School District to shutter the entire campus to in-person learning.

Students engaged exclusively in remote learning four days a week during September and October 2020. From November 2020 - February 2021 students added a fifth in-person day at the district's feeder school Edmunds Elementary and Middle School complex. In March of 2021 students began attending school in a renovated Macy's department store located in downtown Burlington. Though the building continues to evolve into a more visually and functional traditional school, learning in a converted space comes with many challenges. i.e. classrooms without fully encapsulated walls and being one of only three buildings in the state of Vermont with an (frequently dysfunctional) escalator.

All students have access to free lunch, city transportation services, athletics, extracurricular activities, and school counseling services. The greater Burlington community is supportive of the transition and challenges that have accompanied student life after the Covid-19 pandemic and construction of a new high school building (tentatively scheduled to reopen in 2026). The graduating class of 2024 will be the first cohort of Seahorses to complete high school entirely in our downtown location.

Based on 2022-2023 School Year

- BHS offered 12 Advanced Placement classes (305 seats)
- 13 students spent their senior year enrolled in Early College
- 128 college classes were completed through the VT Dual Enrollment program
- 68 students participated in programming at Burlington Technical Center and 14 at the Center for Technology Essex
- 19 students engaged in virtual learning using 41 seats through a partnership with Vermont Virtual Learning Collaborative (VTVLC)
- 42 students participated in Burlington City and Lake, an intensive semester where the city is used as their classroom and curriculum.
